

# 2 + 2 = MORE



Introduced on April 17th of 1964, the Mustang was a runaway sales success. Available in both coupe and convertible body styles, it proved to be popular with both young and old alike. Soon a second plant would be brought online just to keep up with demand.

Gale Halderman and his design team however, thought that it could be even more. They had designed a fastback version but weren't sure that it would get approval from Henry Ford II. They felt that their only shot was to build a mockup. They secretly put together a Mustang with the fastback roof line and painted it Candyapple Red. When they revealed it to Lee Iacocca, he twirled his famous cigar and the rest is history.

This month's cover car is the '65 2+2 of GSRMC member Rick Wagstaff. Rick's pony is Vintage Burgundy with a Palomino interior.The car recently crossed the 118,000 mile mark and Rick has owned it for forty-one years.

He had owned several Mustangs over the years and in 1984, when he was ready for another, he turned to the *Want Ad Press* (Anybody remember that publication). The car was just shy of twenty years old at that point but it still had rust in the usual places; floors, wheel housings and the quarter panels. It was still all original, including the color and the correct C-code 289, 2V V8 that had been rebuilt by the previous owner.

Rick got right into the restoration, with Glazier's Mustang Barn (Still there in PA. but they dropped Glazier's from the name.) replacing the floors, outer

wheel housings and the rear body panel with OEM sheetmetal from Ford. Rick handled most of the remaining work, including removing the engine for a repaint and detailing as well as repainting the car in the original shade of Vintage Burgundy. He also installed an NOS windshield along with the interior including, the upholstery, carpet and headliner. After two years, the car was ready to get back on the road.

Rick's Mustang was fairly well optioned, with the deluxe interior, A/C, tinted windows, Rally Pac, styled steel wheels, remote left side mirror and right side mirror. He also added factory Kelsey Hayes front disc brakes.

Rick has put about 18,000 miles on his pony since he got it over forty years ago. These days, all of those miles are on nice days or to club events.

When undertaking a restoration project you often learn by experience and by other's mistakes. Rick would like to tell you a couple of mistakes he made so that you might avoid them.

When he pulled the engine to detail and repaint it, he painted the block, heads, valve covers and air cleaner assembly factory Gold. Later he discovered that the block heads and intake manifold should be black. Always do your research.

Having worked at a Ford body shop while in college, Rick thought that he would be able to repair the quarter panels himself. After working on them for over 30 hours, he sought professional help, for the car and perhaps himself as well. Know your limits.

Finally, and this has nothing to do with this Mustang, he made a mistake long ago that many have made. In the '70s, leading a bachelor's life, he owned numerous Mustangs. In 1973 a family friend who lived nearby asked if he would be interested in his Mustang. He was the original owner and planned to trade it in on a new Thunderbird. The car had 54,000 miles and was in good shape but the dealer was only offering \$800 in trade. Rick bought it, but that wasn't his mistake. The neighbor's Mustang was a 1968 Shelby GT500 KR convertible that Rick cleaned up and sold for a nice profit. I'm sure it wasn't the six figure payday these cars get today though.

### NC HIGHWAY PATROL FORD MUSTANG CRUISERS OFFICIALLY ROLL OUT

Last April, the North Carolina State Highway Patrol announced that it would be purchasing 25 2024 Ford Mustang GT coupes to add to its fleet, reviving a longstanding tradition of law enforcement agencies employing the popular pony car for such services. Those marked 2024 Ford Mustang GT police cruisers will be patrolling North Carolina interstates in an effort to target speeders and keep the roadways safe. Now, that new fleet of Ford Mustang cruisers has officially landed in the state.

In a recent post on X, the North Carolina State Highway Patrol provided a few photos of its new Ford Mustang fleet of cruisers that gathered for a special commencement ceremony recently at the State Fairgrounds in Raleigh. This gathering also happened to recreate a rather iconic photo taken back in 1929, when the original NCSHP members gathered in precisely the same spot – albeit on motorcycles, and not in Mustangs, obviously.

The NCSHP isn't alone in their endeavor to purchase and utilize the latest S650 generation Ford Mustang, as several other law enforcement agencies across the U.S. are <u>doing precisely the same thing</u>. Back in May of last year, the Georgia State Patrol and South Carolina police announced that <u>they'd be</u> <u>purchasing</u> a handful of 2024 Ford Mustang GT

# SINCE THE '60s, FORD HAS STORED CARS UNDERGROUND IN A KANSAS CITY CAVE

ou may have seen a photo floating around the Internet that depicts a gaggle of Mavericks—not the pickup, but the econocoupe that preceded it—lurking in what appears to be some type of natural cave. Dig a little deeper, and you might even stumble across a sentence or two explaining that these unlikely spelunkers represent

overstock stuffed by Ford into a subterranean system carved deep beneath the bedrock of Missouri.

The image might seem an oddball anachronism, some kind of temporary solution to overflowing dealer lots that somehow made sense in the 1970s. Would it surprise you to find out that Ford is actually entering its *seventh decade* of keeping cars in said caves, which are part of a vast business complex called SubTropolis?

Most of the time, defunct mining operations are viewed as hazards and liabilities. The legacy of resource extraction is highly variable but almost always negative, except in those rare cases where geology and foresight converge to present a singular opportunity.

Such was the case with the Bethany Falls limestone mine, a 1940s operation that dug deep into the 270 million-year-old bedrock underpinning Kansas City, Missouri. In the process, miners procured much of the stone that was used to construct the buildings and infrastructure needed for the bustling metropolis sprouting up in the center of America. Although limestone exports were strong throughout the 1940s, over

the course of the following two decades it began to look like the economic potential of the mine had been fully wrung from the rock. Left behind was a unique complex of stable, moisturefree man-made caverns located within Kansas City limits. Two decades later, it took an outsider to recognize the commercial potential of the mine's skeletal remains.





"The Hunt family got involved when Lamar moved up from Texas and brought the Kansas City Chiefs with him [in 1963]," said Ryan Tompkins, Director of Sales and Leasing at SubTropolis. "He wanted to invest in Kansas City and really show its people that he was here for good. He wanted to put his roots out. So he purchased the active limestone mine at that time."

It's here that SubTropolis began to take shape. Rather than continuing to run the facility exclusively as a mine, Hunt began to use it to store mining equipment as well. It was a solid proof of concept: With a depth of up to 160 feet, the temperature inside the network of tunnels and chambers hovers between 68 and 72 degrees all year round, with humidity sitting at a comfortable 40 percent. Thanks to the miners' use of an extraction technique called the "room and pillar method," the enormous underground cavities left behind are supported by 16-foot pillars; the space is open, regular, and, expansive enough to accommodate nearly anything that can fit through its above-ground, drive-in entrance ramps.

It didn't take long before SubTropolis attracted

its first major client. An article from the *Ford Kansas City News* employee newsletter dated August 30, 1965, features the headline "Parts Storage Area Completed After 560,000,000 Years," and describes the company's plans to use 82,000 square feet

of the SubTropolis facility to support its nearby Kansas City Assembly Plant, which was originally built in 1951. Another article written a month later describes something called the "Ford Family Showing" that welcomed 5000 people into the limestone caves so they could get a look at automaker's 1966 line-up.

"In Kansas, in the Midwest, you get rain, you get hail, you get winter, you get ice, you get everything. And I think [Ford] really wanted to store the vehicles that they were producing and assembling in the area that wouldn't come into harm's way," said Tompkins. "And so what better location than under a large roof? Since then, Ford has relocated its plant and they are now really adjacent to our underground, so we continue to have a really tight relationship with them."

Although Hunt Midwest works with other automotive partners at SubTropolis, Ford is truly the anchor tenant. With its Kansas City plant still building the F-150 pickup (as it has since 1957), and another nearby Missouri facility churning out the Transit van, the company's underground presence has grown alongside both of those product lines.

"It's really <u>Automotive Alley</u>," said Tompkins, referring to the business center built above the caves. "You can consider SubTropolis as the 'basement' to the surface property and buildings up top. In addition to its production facilities, Ford has located its North American Vehicle Logistics facility, called the NAVL facility, right beside us."

What this means, functionally, is that every Transit produced in the United States since 2014 passes through Kansas City. This lure, plus the presence of the evergreen sales monster that is the F-Series, has attracted a critical mass of aftermarket upfitters—companies that modify vans and trucks for various commercial or retail buyers—that have chosen to locate their businesses within the confines of the cave complex.

"Since NAVL arrived, we've added close to two dozen upfitters occupying close to a million square feet.



That's up to 120 acres of vehicle logistics, [which] equates to 13,000 vehicles [in SubTropolis] at any given time," said Tompkins.

That footprint is on top of the 2 million square feet provided by surface buildings. The 7.8 million of available square footage located underground is served by a stunning 10 miles of roads. Those figures are subject to change, as SubTropolis is constantly expanding, and Hunt Midwest claims 55 million square feet of usable space would be available in total should the entire cave system be developed.

The appeal of being close to Ford's infrastructure is only part what's led to SubTropolis' success as a haven for truck and van customization. Kansas City has the advantage of proximity; it is located within a two-day drive of 90 percent of the population of the continental U.S., greatly simplifying transportation and planning for

> operations. Then there's the fact that snowy winters, rainy springs, and blistering summer heat have no impact on underground workers. who are free to comfortably install bedliners or transform a panel van without ever needing to surface. And don't forget, it's hard to beat the security of surrounding your business with

impenetrable limestone.

SubTropolis claims to be the largest underground business facility ever built. By extension, that makes Ford's operations there the largest subterranean automotive operation. With the vast majority of the action hidden from prying eyes, perhaps it's to be expected that most enthusiasts are unfamiliar with the fact that the Blue Oval has been digging into the Missouri bedrock for 70 years. You don't have to be a Bond villain to appreciate the privacy, convenience, and stability of the caves, but it wouldn't be at all surprising to see something like SubTropolis show up as the backdrop for a chase sequence in the next Fast and Furious installment, with Torreto and fam drifting Raptors around 25 square-foot limestone pillars that are as cinematic as they are crucial to supporting an automotive operation like no other.

# HOW I SAVED MY NEIGHBOR'S VINTAGE CORVETTE FROM DEATH BY FIRE

t was a regular Saturday. I was tinkering with a sticky carburetor float on my Lotus Esprit when a neighbor pulled up in his mint 1959 Chevrolet Corvette.

We got to talking, bonding over the pitfalls of fiberglass bodywork, and other assorted highs and lows of the old car ownership. We exchanged numbers and agreed to head out on an early Sunday morning coffee run in our classics.

The weather was hot. When he went to restart the Vette it just wouldn't play ball. We wondered if it was flooded or the high temperatures were causing a fuel evaporation problem. Talk, however, is cheap and it was clear that he couldn't leave his car in the road, so my wife and I began to roll it gently to the curb.

As we pushed, ominous black smoke started spewing from under the hood. My neighbor hopped out and popped the engine cover. Flames leapt out from the edges and I shouted for him to close the hood, while I sprinted back to the Esprit to grab an extinguisher.

Specifically, I grabbed a recently-purchased Fire Safety Stick, which had been recommended by a fellow Esprit enthusiast. Lighter (just 7.6 ounces) and more compact than a regular powder extinguisher, the stick is not unlike a flare, but with the opposite effect.

I rapidly read the instructions, removed the safety cap and struck the top of the stick with the igniter. Inside, the triggered chain reaction caused the stick to emit a powerful spray of nitrogen and potassium free radicals, which starve any fire of oxygen.

Mr. Corvette (he prefers to keep his name out of it) opened the hood again and I pointed the stick at the air filter where the flames were spewing out. He then grabbed it off me to run around the other side of the car and finish the job. Within a minute the fire was out, and a near-\$200,000 vehicle was saved.

Amazingly, there was only a small amount of blistering on the hood from the heat. Even more remarkably, when the owner had to move the car a day later it started on the button.

The people behind the Fire Safety Stick (sold as Element in the U.S.A., www.elementfire.com) told me

that's down to the fact that the product leaves almost no residue behind.

Robinson from Argento Global Solutions, the company that imports the stick in the U.K., explains that's why



many motorsport teams have now started carrying Fire Safety Sticks in addition to traditional plumbed-in extinguisher systems.

The technology, he explained, was actually invented in Soviet Russia during the space race, but it wasn't until 20 years ago or so that an Italian company bought the rights and began manufacturing and selling the devices.

Having seen the stick in action, I immediately ordered another and highly recommend you do the same. Meanwhile, my neighbor, who has a collection of 11 classics, has probably become their biggest customer.
